YSGOL BRO IDRIS Gwynedd

Title: Chwedlau Bro Idris / The Legends of Bro Idris

The project started with a visit by a storyteller who shared local tales and legends with the pupils in classes at each of the school's five sites. Local tales included Cantre'r Gwaelod, Gwylliaid Cochion Mawddwy, Cynwch Lake, the Golden Harp and Idris the Giant. Each site selected one tale as the basis to a variety of engaging activities and tasks which enabled pupils to become familiar with the details of the story and to develop a range of skills. Activities included the preparation of scripts, acting, dancing, creating art work, exploring the local landscape for clues and building palaces in water. They made excellent use of various apps and software, including Morfo, Seesaw and iMovie, to present their work. Pupils from each site used various media, including film, to present their tale to the other classes and at an open evening. The pupils could confidently tell and discuss the stories and were proud to show their high-quality work.

CWMAMAN INFANTS SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Exploring shape, pattern and colour through Welsh quilts

The project developed from a visit to St Fagan's where pupils saw Welsh quilts and learned about how quilt making in Wales developed over time. It is presented through an eye-catching display developed around a timeline of Welsh quilting which traces changes in methods and working practices in quilt making. Pupils have looked at different styles and patterns as well as famous figures in the process. They have a good grasp of shape and pattern through their designs and take great pride in showing and describing their work. Pupils from the Junior School (the schools are amalgamated) have looked at the display and the Y6 class did some work on this topic as a result. The school is planning a 'ceremony' for parents to come and see the display

YSGOL HEOL GOFFA Carmarthenshire

Title: Blue Plaques of Llanelli

Every class in Heol Goffa have focussed their enquiry on one of 10 different Blue Plaques in the Llanelli area. They studied topics such as the Felinfoel Baptismal Pool, James Dickson Innes (landscape artist), Amelia Earhart (pioneer pilot), the Furnace Tollgate and the Rebecca Riots, Highfield House and the invention of the Stepney Wheel and Hugh Percy Wilkins (who mapped the moon for the first time). Most of the classes have completed fieldwork and have developed a good range of enquiry skills using a helpful structure of questions to guide them in their research. Their work is presented using a range of different materials and is attractively displayed in corridors and classrooms across the school. Older and more able pupils have good word processing skills and present their work using commercial ICT packages effectively. They have developed confidence from meeting and questioning local people and this project has had a marked impact on pupil attainment across the school.

YSGOL MAES Y COED Neath Port Talbot

Title: Belonging

The school's tenth birthday was the starting point for a whole-school project to explore the children's sense of self and identity, their community connections and Wales's place in the world. The children led and researched a large number of projects, using varied approaches in which digital skills were prominent. Art underpinned the whole project and was used effectively to explore the area's history. Welsh artists were investigated to see how Wales had inspired their work. There were well-planned visits to explore local points of interest including four museums. The children interviewed local people about their memories about changes. The life of refugee artist Josef Herman in Ystradgynlais brought an international dimension as did sharing knowledge with a partner school in Germany. The project has a strong presence on the school's website. Pupils were enthusiastic in relating what they had discovered.

PORTFIELD SPECIAL SCHOOL Pembrokeshire

Title: A perspective of Pembrokeshire

This whole school project researched sixteen localities in Pembrokeshire. All the pupils benefited from these valuable and worthwhile concrete experiences that were tailored to the needs of each class. The class projects ranged from multi-sensory activities linked to beaches and coal mining to research about the reservoir at Llys y Fran, fishing at Milford, the industrial heritage of Saundersfoot and the castles at Carew, Haverfordwest and Pembroke.

Pupils made detailed 3D models, created newspapers, took photographs, created storyboards and researched the Internet to help make dramatic and accurate displays. They used a range of software applications to present their findings. One group worked very closely with a local artist producing a class painting that was subsequently displayed at a gallery in Haverfordwest.

The school's open afternoon allowed pupils to share their work and present their findings to friends of Portfield and other county schools.

YSGOL PEN-Y-BRYN Swansea

Title: Sport in Swansea then and now

This whole-school project explored sport in Swansea past and present. Seventeen sports were intensively investigated in one half-term through a combination of research, many visits to past and present sporting locations, looking at equipment, including a collection of historic cricket artefacts, trying different sports and asking questions of local sports people. Investigations were interpreted through a variety of ways, including poster displays, artwork, 3D models, audio-visually and digitally. Children celebrated their achievements with a Welsh Sports Day in Welsh Week and a 'Sporty Eisteddfod', with competitions, for example, for the best 3D model of a Swansea sporting venue and for the best written work on a 'sporty Swansea' theme. The joyous school choir sang specially-composed songs in Welsh about sports. The children were enthusiastic in relating their experiences and describing what they had learned about various clubs and their history. Each class produced an iBook to record its project.

YSGOL ARBENNIG HEN FELIN SPECIAL SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Tâf

Title: Local Celts and Druids

Pupils had made connections between local names (e.g. Druids' Close) and features such as Gorsedd circles, and an investigation of daily life in the Iron Age, Celtic arts, crafts and decoration. They presented slides showing the work they had done, reading the commentary with understanding and engagement. They had made jewellery, bookmarks, keyrings and other 'Celtic Keepsakes' (a business venture inspired by their researches) which they had sold at school events. They had visited the Celtic Village at the National History Museum, St Fagans, and recorded their experiences in 2D models and artwork. The group included pupils with very limited abilities, but all showed interest and had used a wide range of evidence. Some spoke of research they had done, and although this was teacher directed, their enquiry skills had clearly been stimulated.

YSGOL BRYN DERW Newport

Title: Monopoly Cymreig

This imaginative project was the vehicle for 8 young people on the autistic spectrum to learn about aspects of their local and Welsh heritage and, importantly, help them develop social skills through working together and playing the game.

The monopoly game created, was based around places in Wales and in the locality. These were organised in chronological order around the board, beginning with the Roman amphitheatre in Caerleon and finishing with the new shopping centre in Newport, Friars Walk. Castles, stately homes, bridges and towns all featured.

Pupils researched for information about each site and downloaded images from the Internet to place on their Monopoly board. 'Chance' cards were questions about Wales and Welsh language terms.

The creation of the game was a very successful activity, helping to enhance pupil confidence and their ability to operate as a team.

YSGOL PENBOYR Carmarthenshire

Title: Cranogwen – Menyw o Flaen ei Hamser – a Woman before her Time

Children from Y3 and Y4 researched Sarah Jane Rees – Cranogwen in an innovative project. Her life as a school teacher, maritime instructor, poet, preacher and lecturer, as well as being the first Welsh woman to edit a magazine for women and as a founder of a temperance movement provided a great source of learning activities. The Llangrannog area, seafaring in Cardigan Bay, the Eisteddfod chair, poetry writing and traditions, Hedd Wyn, as well as Cranogwen's life and times were all researched in depth. Visits were made to Llangrannog, the National Library of Wales, Cardigan Castle, and Yr Ysgwrn, as well as the home of Wales' foremost female poet. Pupils created their own information sheets, a website, news clips and a radio programme, which was broadcast nationally. They had enjoyed searching for the whereabouts of Cranogwen's Eisteddfod chair, using Twitter and subsequent national media interest in their success in finding it.

THORNHILL PRIMARY Cardiff

Title: Armistice Cantata

This project was part of an intergenerational piece of work written by the Year 4/5 children after visiting the Glamorgan Archives to learn about the WW1 through letters and in conjunction with the charity *Goldies Cymru*. Pupils made varied and targeted use of the Glamorgan Archive and built the foundations for their project from this. In composing the Cantata pupils took songs which were out of copyright and wrote their own lyrics to the music. The accompanying narrative is skilfully integrated into the themes and topics covered in the songs. The presentation has pace, momentum and pupils convey a strong sense of period, successfully conveying values, opinions and emotions of the time. Pupils have built-up very solid knowledge and understanding of the range of topics considered and have already performed publicly and shared their work with other primary schools in Cardiff. This dissemination is continuing and being built upon.

WILLIAMSTOWN COMMUNITY SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: From Pit to Port - A Woman's Story

This whole school project provided wide ranging opportunities for pupils to learn about aspects of women's daily lives in a mining community, spanning 150 years. Children enthusiastically displayed their knowledge about how women's lives were affected by history, geology, community and humanity, and how women were the anchor of valley family life.

Younger pupils engaged in practical activities about 'Bath Time', 'Shopping' and'Wash day Worries'. Older pupils focused on women who made a difference in their communities. e.g. local philanthropists such as Caroline Elizabeth Williams and Miss Jenkins, and at a national level. They studied the lives of Elizabeth Andrews and her campaigns for better conditions for women in mining communities and the suffragette, Margaret Mackworth (Lady Rhondda). The part played by women in the improvement of medical services was addressed.

The large school foyer area features an impressive display of artefacts, visual evidence and a variety of pupils' work all linked to a picture timeline.

The work has been shared throughout the school, with cluster schools, families and governors and through social media.

YSGOL BRO HEDD WYN Gwynedd

Title: Hedd Wyn a'r Rhyfel Byd Cyntaf / Hedd Wyn and the First World War

To commemorate the centenary since the death of Hedd Wyn, pupils researched his life, other soldiers from the area and the main battles at which they fought during WWI. A wide range of appropriate sources were used including visits to Yr Ysgwrn ,the bard's home and the local archive, to read original letters. They interviewed Gerald Williams, Hedd Wyn's nephew and used data bases to gather information regarding soldiers and battles. They produced a variety of quality presentations from creative writing, design and technology, drama, art, creation of a treasure hunt to film clips and engaged with the community through a series of local events.

A group of Year 6 pupils shared their knowledge by taking part in the Kids in Museums Takeover Day at Yr Ysgwrn. The pupils involved had worked hard to research and learn facts about the bard, his home and the Black Chair. They led tours for the public who visited on the day.

BAGLAN PRIMARY SCHOOL Neath and Port Talbot

Title: Steel Town to Tinsel Town – Michael Sheen's Story.

This was a very exciting project, professionally and enthusiastically executed throughout the whole school, with the total inclusion of pupils and great staff support.

The focus of the project was the life of a very successful and inspirational local character, Michael Sheen, and looked, not only at his ancestry and amazing professional success, but also at his passions and beliefs which included work on the NHS and Aneurin Bevan. A truly inspirational character, he provided the children with the message that they can achieve anything to which they put their minds.

A very colourful interpretation of 'This is Your Life, Michael Sheen' was told through dialogue, in Welsh and English, music, dance and recitation and was performed for members of the community. It was greatly enjoyed by Michael Sheen and his family.

YSGOL Y BEDOL Carmarthenshire

Title: Welsh Legends / Chwedlau Cymru

Each class explored a different legend - Dewi Sant, Gelert, Santes Dwynwen, Llyn Llech Owain, Culhwch and Olwen, Arthur, Cantre'r Gwaelod and the Twrch Trwyth. The project was used as a context to effectively enhance language and ICT skills and also developed pupils' knowledge and understanding of Wales. Pupils wrote newspaper articles, poems and pen portraits of significant characters. They made models of castles and love spoons and researched the Internet to help them write songs and research works of art relating to landscapes.

Visits to sites that are linked to some of the stories, the theatre to see how some of the legends are interpreted today and to work with local artists all significantly enhanced the understanding and enjoyment of pupils.

The schools worked well with a range of local outside agencies such as Menter Bro Dinefwr and the local community council to explore the impact of the local legends on their community.

YSGOL BRO ALLTA Caerphilly

Title: Hanes y diwydiant glo a Streic y Glowyr 1984-5 yn ardal Ystrad Mynach / The history of the coal industry and the Miners' Strike 1984-5 in the Ystrad Mynach area

This carefully planned project has enabled pupils to develop a close knowledge and understanding of their community and how the events of the early/mid 1980s impacted upon it. The focal point is Penallta Colliery but it extends outward to cover Wales and the English coalfields as well as the political arguments at Westminster and wider afield. Presentation includes a display at the local library, a number of digital productions and drama reconstructions. Pupils have skilfully used oral, visual and written evidence to build knowledge and understanding of Penallta. The project has also investigated the issues, factors and developments leading up to the 1984 Miners Strike and its aftermath. The pupils have looked at a wide range of primary and secondary sources. Pupils show a firm understanding of the development of Penallta Colliery and also the events of 1984-85 and its impact on both their locality and on Wales.

CWMLAI PRIMARY Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Who Do You Think You Are?

The project took family history as a starting point and placed the stories and discoveries of pupils in the wider context of local, national and international history. The project has provided pupils with a comprehensive picture of their families, how their community developed and its links to the rest of South Wales and the wider world. The overwhelming importance of coal mining in the growth of their community and their families' roles in it has been the most significant discovery for the pupils. They have used a wide range of primary and secondary sources to develop their very good knowledge and understanding of why their community grew and changed over time. Pupils across the ability range show a consistent ability to give clear and valid explanations. The project has generated a massive range and variety of stories that pupils show great interest and pride in.

DARREN PARK PRIMARY, FERNDALE Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Collieries and Catastrophes

The project focused on the 150th anniversary of the disaster at the Ferndale & Blaenllechau colliery. In so doing it enabled pupils to gain a range of in-depth insights on the disaster, the coal mining industry and the way of life in the Rhondda Fach at the time. The presentation is well-organised and in varied formats, including presentations by individual pupils, wall display, video, PowerPoint and film. Pupils have undertaken a wide range of work across the curriculum. They have made particularly good use of Census returns to build up a picture of life in the Rhondda Fach in the second half of the 19th century and of photographs of the colliery to recreate a replica model using a range of digital technology. Pupils have a very good knowledge and understanding of the events in question and of conditions underground at the time.

Title: Aspects of local heritage – Edwardsville and Treharris.

Every pupil in Reception to year 5 contributed to displays for this project which covered aspects of local heritage from Trevithick's locomotive, the history of the Edwardsville Truant School and Treharris Library, to the experiences of miners at Deep Navigation Colliery. The older pupils had started by asking many interesting questions following a visit and talk by an ex-miner of Deep Navigation Colliery. Pupils across all the year groups produced imaginative writing and art, and showcased their literacy, numeracy and ICT skills well. The work of all the year 5 pupils has been on public display at Treharris Boys and Girls Club where it has been admired by many members of the local community. The pupils have gained a lot of local knowledge and are very proud of their local community and its heritage.

Title: The Newport Transporter Bridge

A visit to the Newport Transporter Bridge was the basis for this project. During the visit, pupils and teachers climbed to the top walkway and walked across the bridge to the other side and then travelled back across via the gondola. Their visit to the bridge helped the pupils understand both how it worked and why such an unusual design had been necessary. They clearly understood the impact the bridge had had on the area and appreciated its historical importance as one of the few surviving transporter bridges. A visit to the University of South Wales in Newport allowed pupils to participate in workshops on bridge building as part of the STEM related work of their project. Pupils' work included a timeline of the history of the bridge, recounts, poems, a newsletter about the bridge, illustrations, a simple model of the bridge, and a quiz. A special assembly was held to disseminate their work to the wider community.

Title: Gwauncelyn - The Golden Years

This project celebrates 50 years of Gwauncelyn Primary School. The youngest pupils undertook fact finding about significant dates in the school's history and heard stories of school life in the Sixties.

Pupils spoke confidently, devised questions and recorded the memories of past pupils and teachers.

The work of Y5 and Y6 pupils about the economic and social life of 1960s Tonteg was impressive. Topics included housing, jobs, transport, television, facilities and linked to key national and international events. Past and present comparisons were made and the positive and negative consequences of the changes were assessed.

Information was gathered from historical maps, newspaper clippings, family photographs and school log books. The pupils were most enthusiastic about the stories provided by their own families and 'friends of the school'.

The research work is displayed throughout the school and on the school web site.

YSGOL LLANAELHAEARN Gwynedd

Title: Y Celtiaid a Thre'r Ceiri / The Celts and Tre'r Ceiri

A very creative project, with learning through experience across the curriculum central to all the work. The school sits at the foot of Tre'r Ceiri, an Iron Age hillfort, and this was the inspiration for the project. Through working with artist Manon Awst and actor Gwion Aled Williams, the pupils created puppets, scripts, films, murals, and various artworks and engraving with Ogam language lettering and they made a sun dial with these. They handled and discussed artefacts in Oriel Môn and baked bread and listened to stories in a Celtic roundhouse in Felin Uchaf Centre. One of the highlights of the project which combined drama, art, poetry and film was 'Y Floedd' which they had created and which won the Groundwork North Wales competition. All these experiences meant that the pupils were immersed in the history of the Celts and their enthusiasm for the subject was infectious.

Title: Our Community

Pupils had investigated the history of their local coal mines and the coal industry more generally. They are working in partnership with two other local schools (Brynna and Llantrisant) which have investigated different aspects of the local heritage, and the schools' findings are being presented in a joint mosaic mural. The finished mosaic will have borders based on patterns seen in local brickwork, and this idea had come directly from one of the Y3 pupils.

Pupils had used a wide range of evidence, including the oral evidence of family and community members, who had responded to an invitation to attend three 'history cafés' at the school. The school will be displaying the completed mural both collectively with the partner schools and as an individual school.

Title: Gilbern Cars - A Welsh Dream

An interesting whole school project studying the history of the Gilbern car production in the village. It was started by a former German P.O.W. at the end of World War 2. The project has been presented mainly online as a website which is accessed via various points in the village including a blue plaque. It has caught the imagination of parents and wider community who have all supported the pupils in their research and the building of their own model car. In their historical enquiry pupils have used a range of sources including websites, artefacts, buildings, sites, talking to adults, visual sources, data and appropriate written sources. Their work which also covered other aspects of the curriculum has been carefully selected, recorded and organised into a lasting contribution for future generations through the school website.

Title: Betsi Cadwaladr - Bala to Balaklava

This whole school project, which originally formed the focus for the school's Welsh week celebrations, arose from a pupil's question about the local health Board – 'Who was Betsi Cadwaladr?' All 82 pupils took part in the research and production of a series of multimedia presentations based in different locations around the school. Pupils researched and charted the life and times of the Welsh born nurse famous for her work in the Crimea. They produced bi-lingual posters, artwork, a short film, dramatic reconstructions and musical interpretations based on their findings. Resources they used included maps, paintings, photographs of Betsi and her grave, her autobiography, newspaper articles and a variety of websites. They will be exhibiting their findings, and performing, in an exhibition to be staged in the local church, and their presentation is available both on the school's website and the media platform See-saw.

Title: Researching the Mabinogion

The focus of this whole school project was to develop an interest in the legends of the Mabinogion through research, discussion and study of local aspects of the landscape reflected in the stories.

The youngest pupils produced family trees to develop an understanding of change over time. Years 1 and 2 pupils looked at the story of Culhwch and Olwen with the Red Book of Hergest and the White Book of Rhydderch featuring strongly in their studies. Y3 pupils studied the Celtic period and looked in detail at Garn Goch, a local Iron Age hill fort. Pupils from Y4 explored the Middle Ages, the period when the books were written and the local church and castle. Years 5 and 6 looked at the stories of the Mabinogion reviewing the way the stories were recorded, the work of Lady Charlotte Guest, current versions and other interpretations that have been produced for use on television.

Title: The Trethomas Carnivals

The project looked at the history of the community Carnival in Trethomas. As part of their investigations, pupils looked back over the last 100 years with each year group studying a different decade or special event.

The displays of the pupils work throughout the school were excellent including younger children making a replica village and carnival parade; Work by older pupils included designing and creating a horse for a carousel ride along with other fayre / carnival games and rides; designing and making carnival floats and using digital technology to mechanise them.

The pupils presented an assembly to parents, local community members, local AMs and Mayoral officers. They showed a video of preparations for the carnival then took the audience on a journey through time with folk dancing, musicians and the school choir performing a medley of songs through the decades.

Title: The Four R's of Wolfscastle

This project involved all the KS2 pupils of the school who were taught in one class. Each year group studied an aspect of the locality beginning with the letter R. Y3 looked at the rocks, Y4, the river, Y5 the roads and Y6 the railways. Each group had visited a particular locality to begin their investigations. Y3 children had been taken by a local farmer to look at the volcanic rocks which dominate the Treffgarne Gorge area while Y4 pupils who studied the river had learned from local inhabitants about problems caused by flooding in the past. The two groups of older children discovered that the physical geography of the area had a substantial impact on the history of the construction of roads and railways. The diverse nature of the study offered ample opportunity for the production of a wide variety of very interesting and interpretive material.

Title: Hanes Ysgol Gymraeg Bryn-y-môr a datblygiad addysg Gymraeg yn ein hardal / The history of Ysgol Gymraeg Bryn-y-môr and the development of Welsh-medium education in our area

This was a thorough exploration of the history of the school building, opened in 1915 until the present, paying special attention to its development as a Welsh-medium school from 1963. This was placed in its historical context through the pupils' research into the history of Welsh-medium education in Swansea and in a wider context the history of the Welsh language in Wales. The pupils had used a wide variety of sources, especially the school logbooks, photographs, newspaper reports, oral history, statistics and online questionnaire. They had discussed the reliability of these sources and the representations in them. This was presented in a variety of video presentations and animations, work on numeracy, and some artwork. The project has been disseminated to governors and the school community and to interested parties all over the world via the school website.

They had been on a visit to the castle itself with author, Jenny Sullivan, and this was used as a stimulus for creative writing.



Y5, however, were involved in an innovative project, built around questions asked by the mysterious 'Victor' a former WW2 pilot who arrived at the school one day suffering from amnesia.

Pupils demonstrated good IT skills which they used for research, presentation and communication. They particularly enjoyed questioning elderly residents, baking according to ration menus and organising a VE Day party at which they showed off their dancing skills.

Following on from work conducted on Van Mansion, a whole school project focussed on the origins of the Eisteddfod in Caerphilly, at Van Mansion. A film was produced and presented by year 6 pupils to detail the scope of the work undertaken by each class. Title: War and Peace

112 Y5 and Y6 pupils have been immersed in the cross-curricular study of the First and Second World Wars. Welsh aspects include the story of Hedd Wyn, the Cardiff and Swansea Blitz and evacuation. All pupils have detailed workbooks with work illustrating a range of writing genres and an oral presentation. Together they have performed a drama, 'We'll Meet Again' and have undertaken a re-enactment of an evacuee journey on the Brecon Mountain Railway.

A wide range of secondary sources have been used and artefacts have been used to stimulate questioning and discussion. Pupils have received visits from a former evacuee, Cyfarthfa Castle Museum and Art Gallery and Firing Line: Cardiff Castle Museum of the Welsh Soldier.

8 pupils will disseminate information about their study when they visit Italy in the Summer Term as part of an Erasmus project. Their depth of knowledge was impressive and their enthusiasm was unbounded.

Many more women were studied too. The pupils made colourful and interesting PowerPoint presentations which included newspaper reports, quizzes, films they had made themselves and even an interview with a pupil roleplaying one of the famous women they had studied. These demonstrated their presentational and ICT skills well. The pupils had clearly been enthused and inspired by the stories of the women they had studied.

Every class in the school participated fully in this submission. Each class was given the opportunity to look at a specific legend with some groups looking at local stories about Llyn Llech Owain and Llyn y Fan Fach whilst others looked at national stories - Cantre'r Gwaelod, Myrddin, Dinas Emrys and Santes Dwynwen.

The project was inspired by the Welsh Tourist Board theme of the "Year of Legends" and generated an extensive range of cross curricular activities with groups using animation skills to clearly retell stories and produce "moving books". A Top Trumps card game was made to help explain one story. A song about Llyn y Fan Fach was composed and performed by one class. Older pupils worked with a blacksmith to design and create 3D masks. Script writing skills were enhanced when legends were rewritten so they could be performed at the school eisteddfod.

The finding of the original school log books from 1878 inspired this study of the school's history. Each class studied a particular 30 year period.

Log books and registers were used together with books, old newspaper reports, searching the Internet and visits to the nearby Rhondda Heritage Park Museum. Families and friends in this close knit community shared memories including a past pupil in her 90s and a local historian.

A coffee morning brought the community together and an online local history Facebook group galvanised the memories of a wider audience.

The pupils work was shared with the community during a second coffee morning.

As part of their thematic work Y3 and Y4 have been learning about schools in Victorian Times. The pupils noticed that classes, teachers and customs in that period were very different from those of today.

Thus, following a trip to Ysgol Maestir in St Fagans National History Museum and participating in an 'actual' Victorian classroom, the pupils decided to research how education has gone from slate to iPad in barely 100 years. The pupils had looked in detail at children's education in Victorian Times. They had enjoyed the work and learned a great deal through their use of the role play area to recreate and act being teachers and pupils from the period.

They decided to research how schools had changed too and they were keen to interview parents and grandparents. Every child had an opportunity to interview family members and the results and conclusions were very interesting. This was conveyed by means of a video presentation.

The pupils work will be showcased in a special assembly and has featured in the Parish Newsletter.

Ysgol Bro Idris KS2 pupils have created an interesting and engaging film introducing the life of Hedd Wyn. Classes, on 5 sites, researched different elements of his life, including life on the farm, Yr Ysgwrn, recruiting young men to join the army, the horrid conditions at war, writing the winning poem, his family finding out he was killed and the Black Chair arriving home. Various sources were used (including a range of books, websites and watching the Mewn Cymeriad Hedd Wyn show) to research Ellis Evans' history and to select appropriate images, photographs, artefacts and music which could be used to prepare the 30-minute film. To present their findings the pupils created their own scripts, original graphics and artwork and used various apps and software, including 'Green Screen', 'Stopmotion' and 'Morfo', to prepare the final film.

Title: The Good Old Days of Johnstown

This was an intergenerational project looking at the history of Johnstown Primary School primarily through the eyes of four former pupils, 'The Old Johnstown Boys', who had been interviewed on film. This research led them to looking at old buildings in the area, e.g. the toll-house, the Nissen hut and the old school building through old photographs, maps and visits to the sites. The pupils presented the digital project using green screens in the interviews, interactive maps and quizzes. They had introduced digital links to other websites to further explain the background to the toll-houses and the Rebecca Riots and the Nissen Huts and prisoners of war. They compared the 'good old days' and today in Johnstown School and in the locality. The topic had been chosen initially through a whole school vote, 'Llais y Plentyn'.

The main starting point and focus of this project was the food industry in the Eifionydd area but it evolved into a much wider project following the pupils' enquiries. They used many original sources to stimulate discussion and further research e.g. butter stamps, the school log book, newspaper articles, archive photographs and the documentary film 'Yr Etifeddiaeth', filmed in Llangybi and district in 1947-49. The pupils at Llangybi school are very aware of their heritage and they presented the interesting history of their area with confidence and understanding.

Title: Menywod Cocos Penclawdd/ The women cockle pickers of Penclawdd

This project was completed by Y6 pupils and focussed on the lifestyle and working conditions of the Penclawdd women cockle pickers in the Loughor Estuary during the 18th and 19th centuries. Pupils researched the Internet and engaged with a local historian and an inhabitant of Penclawdd to gather facts, images and information about historical events, tragedies and the lifestyle of cockle pickers. They discussed and evaluated emerging evidence and images to develop a good understanding of social conditions for cockle workers. They have a good understanding of how the cockles were gathered and processed before being taken to Swansea market and contrast this with modern harvesting and marketing techniques. Pupils produced a script which was performed and filmed using a Green Screen with images of traditional women cockle pickers as background.

This pupil selected project was based on the life of Bartholomew Roberts who was otherwise known as the pirate Barti Ddu and was born in the neighbouring village of Casnewydd Bach. The children had researched his life as a pirate, his ships and the areas of the Atlantic Ocean and Caribbean Sea he had operated in. Some had drawn maps or written about his adventures, and these with other PowerPoint generated material, were used to support their introductory presentation. The group had benefitted from an Arts Council for Wales grant to work with an artist to construct in wood a large scale model of a sailing ship of that era. They had also been supported by a drama specialist to write a play on the life of Barti Ddu and this was performed before parents in the school hall.

During a STEM Cymru project on Formula 1 the pupils found out that here in Wales we have had some exceptional racing drivers that have held land speed records. They examined old photographs and watched old news footage. They have produced a film in which they report against the backdrop of the 1924 land speed record attempt and a PowerPoint presentation.

The children from Saint Illtyd's determined that the focus for their film would be historical and would concentrate on three places of local interest in close proximity to the school. These were St. Illtyd's Church, Old Place and the Town Hall.

The children visited and filmed in these locations and used information given to them by members of the Llantwit Major History Society and volunteers within these sites.

Title: Tonyrefail Primary through the ages

The school closes in July, becoming part of a 3-19 establishment. The project has enabled pupils to find out a lot about Tonyrefail Primary School over time as well as the community it serves. It has involved working with teachers, grandparents and parents. It covers many areas of the curriculum and pupils have undertaken much written, numeracy and art work. Parents and grandparents have been prominently involved in pupils' enquiries and pupils have developed a good sense of change and continuity and similarity and difference over time. They know about some of the main features of each of the periods they looked at and have built up a good knowledge of daily life in their school over the time that it has existed.

Title: Leisure time in Hawthorn

This project is the work of a weekly extra-curricular history club with eleven pupils attending voluntarily. They wanted to research how people spent their leisure time a hundred years ago compared with today. This interest was sparked when the question 'Why is the local football field known as '*The Dogtrack*?' was asked. They researched activities online and were surprised that very few women competed competitively compared with today. They discovered that some activities have been enjoyed through the ages whilst today there are many new activities plus leisure centres. All pupils demonstrated full knowledge and understanding of the topic.

BRYNTIRION COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL, BRIDGEND Bridgend

Title: The Wartime Bridgend Project

The project has covered Bridgend's involvement with World War 1 and World War 2. The History Club wanted to construct a permanent memorial to local men who gave their lives for peace and set about researching parish and military records, creating tiles bearing the 53 names of those local men to be displayed in the school foyer. Family involvement was researched, a visit was made to the battlefields, poppies were placed for the first time on the graves of family members. Subsequently, Bryntirion was the first school in Wales to be twinned with the Flanders Peace Field and on the 10 July, 2017 the anniversary of Mametz Wood, the whole school was involved in a WW1 themed day. The Peace Field plaque was inaugurated in a formal assembly. The continuation into WW2 took place over a year. Pupils met with the town council to look at ways to preserve Bridgend's wartime history, held a WW2 themed day in the town, designed and created a memorial walkway, and collected and published local research. Learning packs were provided for feeder primary schools and placed on the project website. Pupils hosted a range of events in school and the town centre, together with lectures from a variety of historians.

YSGOL MAESYDDERWEN, YSTRADGYNLAIS Powys

Title: 'Cynefin' - (Our Welcome)

Maesydderwen History Club conducted research into Kindertransport and the refugees who have come into the community over time. They researched local family history and became interested in refugee status which linked in with other work by the school on gaining recognition for the UNICEF the 'Rights of the Child' and School of Sanctuary. This led to research into the life of Josef Herman, one of Ystradgynlais' most famous refugees. They linked with the Welfare Hall to develop a short film entitled Cynefin which looked at the theme of refugees past and present. The film encompassed a number of Syrian refugees who have recently settled there. Pupils used their research to script the film and learnt to create drawings and stills and to create animations; Pupils worked with professional musicians to create music for the film and secured Michael Sheen as the voice of Josef Herman. A second film charted the story of the Syrian refugees to Ystradgynlais and was presented by Syrian refugees who are pupils at the school. Both films were presented to the community at the Welfare Hall and are on the school website.

Title: Roots and Wings-Developing the Cwricwlwm Cymreig across the school

Pupils in years 7, 8 and 9 have developed innovative approaches and resources mainly in History, Science, DT and Welsh to support y Cwricwlwm Cymreig within the school and further afield. Over 600 different high quality resources have been developed by pupils mainly in KS3, and with a few examples in KS 4.

Pupils have developed their knowledge and understanding of the significant work of a large number of notable Welsh people and events. This work has developed pupils understanding of how key individuals have developed thinking and practice in a national and international context within these subject areas. This has proved to be a source of motivation and inspiration for pupils. The materials produced by them are used to further enrich the curriculum for other pupils within the school and further afield.



Title: Llambed Yn Ystod Y Rhyfel Byd Cyntaf

The History Club of year 9 pupils presented a project based upon a study of the fallen soldiers, sailors and one nurse commemorated on the town's War Memorial. The emphasis was upon the individual and that each name on the memorial has a story. This was interpreted through two excellent and sensitively produced videos, one of the fallen men/women and the other relating to Lampeter's contribution to the war effort – e.g. by sending harmonicas out to the troops, by providing shelter for Belgian refugees. Two exhibitions complemented these videos and these were explained in further detail by the students. The pupils understanding of the wider implications of the First World War was shown through their discussions about these exhibitions. This project will be a very good introduction to the proposed visit to the war graves in Belgium.

Title: Lewis Lore

The project centres on retelling stories from a book, 'Tales of the Rhymney Valley'. It serves also to focus on Thomas Matthews, who had promoted the study of local folk lore while a teacher at Lewis Boys School. He was a powerful advocate for Wales and Welsh culture. It is, furthermore, a memorial to two pupils who were involved in his projects and who were both killed in the Great War. The English, Art and Music departments are involved in the project. The writing was developed from workshops with the KS 3 literacy coordinator and the author of Tales of the Rhymney Valley. There is much good quality original writing alongside varied and imaginative art work. The project has enabled the school to use its well-established community links to good effect. The outcomes include Lewis Lore, an attractive book, and a striking mural of Thomas Matthews.

Title: Remembering Our Fallen Soldiers

As it is nearing the 100th anniversary of the signing of the armistice to herald the end of WW1, the History club pupils wanted to gain an understanding of the war and produce work that would commemorate and remember Pencoed's fallen heroes. Pupils worked independently and collaboratively to produce a folio of work which included historical research, the study of WW1 poetry, the writing of original poetry, family and local data. They also have scripted an introduction to their project, produced a news report video, choreographed dance and mime to reflect aspects of the conflict, which will form the substance of a service at the school on the 11th November this year.

Title: The Human Cost of Coal

The title, 'The Human Cost of Coal', resonated with pupils living in a community defined by the history of the coal industry. Class lessons provided an initial framework leading to pupils' independent research. Studies made reference to the centenary of the major pit disaster of 1867 which killed 178 men and boys and examined the causes of deaths and injuries.

The pupils provided alternative interpretations about the impact of coal mining in Rhondda: its identity, community, the employment provided and culture set against the high loss of life, injuries, the impact on women's health working at home, the environmental devastation from pit waste and pollution and the impact of immigration on the use of the Welsh language.

Pupils used a Royal Commission report, resource packs, photographs and Internet resources. The materials generated are to be used with primary schools.

PONTYPRIDD HIGH SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Remembering Glyn Rhys Morgan

This project originated with an approach by a film company, 'Just Druids Productions' to the school to take part in a film about the Battle of Passchendaele. Research had unearthed a letter from a soldier, Glyn Rhys Morgan, to his father on the night before 'going over the top' during the battle. The father was Headteacher of Pontypridd Boys Grammar School at the time and Glyn a former pupil.

Two classes, one in Y7 and one in Y8 discussed how they should remember Glyn. They divided into groups to work on generated ideas – creating freeze-frame illustrations of battle scenes, creating a mural, writing poetry, doing further research on the school in 1917, studying Glyn's letter and writing responses. All these activities were filmed by a professional cameraman. The idea was to conclude the film by showing that learning about WW1was important to the modern generation.



A small group of Y8 pupils, girls and boys, spent a morning with Richard Shepherd, author of several books on Cardiff City FC and a collector of memorabilia related to the team. Thus, pupils were able to learn about the origins of the team, its history from 1899 up until the present day and examine old photographs, match programmes and newspaper articles. They spent the afternoon in the computer suite undertaking further research, including searching the Cardiff City website and the FA website. As a result of this day the pupils have produced a PowerPoint presentation which they have shown to pupils in Y7.

They were enthusiastic about their topic and particularly in the early days of football and its appeal as a huge mass spectator sport. They looked forward to ending their project by adding another promotion to their list of Cardiff City's achievements.

Title: The Welsh Revival and Welsh Chapels

The project was completed by pupils from Years 7 to 10. The work focussed on the Welsh Revival in South Wales in 1904. This led to pupils producing work in art, English and music. They used a range of techniques and developed their skills by producing a collage, watercolour paintings, sketches of local chapels and brass rubbings from a local church.

Their critical appreciation of art focussed on a 1908 painting "Salem" by Sydney Curnow Vosper. This analysis provided a useful wider context to their work. They sang a well-known Welsh hymn and folk song as background to the project.

Pupils researched historical sources about the Welsh Revival. Using images of abandoned chapels they wrote a short descriptive, atmospheric piece which aimed to promote a sense of contrast between the present time and the period of the Revival.
